Minnesota Association of Watershed Districts (MAWD) Legislative Committee Meeting

WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS

Jackie Anderson called meeting to order at 1:06. She explained that the purpose of the meeting was to review the 2022 legislative platform and determine any known changes. The committee will meet again, shortly after the annual meeting, to incorporate all adopted resolutions into the Active MAWD Resolutions document. The final platform recommendation will be sent to the MAWD Board in early January 2023 for approval.

TASK ONE. REVIEW 2022 LEGISLATIVE PLATFORM RESULTS

The Legislative Committee received an update from Ray Bohn, MAWD Lobbyist, on the 2022 Legislative Session and work done on MAWD Legislative Priorities. He explained the effects of COVID on lobbying and bills that did not pass. He also stated that he was hesitant to contact legislators regarding key issues at this point because it is mid-season for campaigns and candidates are busy. He was asked to develop a list of legislators that would be crucial to contact regarding the general operating levy so members can begin contacting those individuals. Discussion was held regarding the importance of using the MAWD regional meetings to invite legislators and candidates to discuss watershed issues.

TASK TWO. PREPARE A PRELIMINARY 2023 LEGISLATIVE PLATFORM RECOMMENDATION

The following information was provided to committee members in the meeting packet.

The Legislative Committee is asked to prepare a legislative platform to present for consideration to the MAWD Board of Directors (Board) at their January meeting each year. To effectively use the time when the legislature is not in session, the legislative committee is asked to prepare a preliminary platform recommendation after the Legislature adjourns sine die. This allows time to prepare for next year's session. After the MAWD Annual Meeting and Resolutions Hearing, which is held in December, the committee will meet again. At that meeting, priorities will be assigned to the newly passed resolutions and determine if any of the new issues should rise above the top priority issues identified in the preliminary platform. To facilitate formation of the preliminary platform, we will be reviewing the list of active resolutions, archive any resolved issues, and assign a priority status to each issue. Committee recommendations will be sent to the Board for review and approval.

It should be noted that in July, the Board voted to extend the sunsetting deadline for current resolutions by two years due to the pandemic and its influence on lobbying efforts.

The committee discussed each item on the 2022 platform and determined whether recommendations should be made to change priorities. Preliminary recommendations are included on the next page.

As far as moving forward with platform items that require legislative action, Ray Bohn will meet with the Revisor during the process of drafting legislation once we have an author.

TASK THREE. REVIEW LEGISLATIVE INITIATIVES IN THE DRAFT STRATEGIC PLAN

The following information was provided to committee members in the meeting packet.

In the strategic planning process, several suggestions were made for evaluating and improving the resolutions and legislative processes. The committee will discuss the goal, objectives, strategies, and tactics in the draft Strategic Plan (Plan).

Discussion was held regarding the recommendations made by the Minnesota Association of Watershed Administrators (MAWA) and the importance of developing a platform similar to that of the Association of Minnesota Counties and the Minnesota Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. No changes were made to the draft Plan recommendations. Attendees were asked to provide any changes by the end of the day on September 30. The Plan will be discussed in more depth at a future meeting following the Plan's adoption by the membership.

TASK FOUR. DISCUSS CONNECTING WITH LEGISLATORS AND LEGISLATIVE CANDIDATES

The following information was provided to committee members in the meeting packet.

The committee will discuss the information provided in the legislative update and develop suggestions for MAWD members to connect with their legislators and legislative candidates.

Chair Anderson read the recommendations that were made in December of 2020. There was an email delivery issue before the meeting, so she will provide this information to the committee following the meeting. Chair Anderson pointed out that the recommendations made in 2020 were very similar to those in the MAWA letter and in the draft Plan, which is a good sign that the Plan's direction should be acceptable to many diverse organizations in the state. The 2020 recommendations were adopted by the Board but only partially implemented due to the pandemic.
